PASTOR'S PARAGRAPH

You can sit in a pew for years and never feel known.

That's the quiet tragedy of church in our time – not the decline of programs, but the erosion of belonging. In a culture of curated lives and digital disconnection, the deep ache is not for entertainment or inspiration – it's for relationship. For people to know your name and your story. For someone to notice when you're not okay.

Thriving congregations know this. They're not just friendly, they're familial. They create space where masks come off and real stories surface. They understand what Paul meant when he wrote, "Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep." That kind of community doesn't happen by accident. It takes courage, commitment, and the kind of love that refuses to let people disappear.

During churchwide conversations, people shared moments when they felt the sting of being left out and the healing that came when they were truly welcomed. One person said, "The time I felt like I belonged most was when someone remembered a small detail I shared and brought it up weeks later. I knew I mattered."

That's what authentic community looks like: paying attention.

In Acts 2, we see a church not just gathering for worship but sharing meals, resources, and lives. It wasn't just communal – it was committed. "They devoted themselves to fellowship and the Lord added to their number daily." Belonging became the soil where faith could grow.

It's not always easy. Authenticity requires vulnerability. Community means conflict. It asks us to stay at the table even when things get awkward or hard. It means moving beyond affinity groups and comfort zones. It means listening when someone's experience challenges our own. And yet this is where the Spirit shows up. In Galatians, Paul writes, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." That law isn't a doctrine – it's love. Radical, inconvenient, reconciling love.

Thriving churches are learning to reimagine community through new lenses: potlucks that mix generations, small groups that make space for grief and doubt, pews that stretch to include people who don't look, vote, or speak like each other. It's not just about who's present – it's about who feels safe enough to stay.

The Gospel has always been about community. Jesus called a motley crew of fishermen, zealots, and tax collectors not to sit in rows, but to walk together. He wept with friends, blessed children, touched the untouchable, and shared tables with outsiders. And he told us to do the same.

Thriving congregations are reclaiming that radical hospitality. They're choosing presence over performance. They're cultivating a culture where every person: young and old, joyful and grieving, confident and questioning can say, "I belong here."

In a world starving for connection, that might be the most powerful witness of all.

Suggested items to donate for children up to age 16:

Books (for every age group)
Drawing sets/crafts kits/science kits
Games (board games or card games)
Batteries (as we like to provide them if they are needed with toys and games)
Toys but please NO toy weapons

Some of the hardest items that they tend to receive less of is for toddler age and teenagers. Some

ideas for teenagers are watches, wallets, purses, costume jewelry, make up/nail polish, beauty & self-care items, hats and sporting goods.

For babies and toddlers: Learning toys. Musical toys, infant toys/plush toys
