PASTOR'S PARAGRAPH

Thriving churches are not stuck in time. They are rooted, yes—but never rigid. They know the difference between being grounded in the Gospel and being glued to "the way we've always done it."

Flexibility is not about chasing trends or bending to every cultural breeze. It's about faithful responsiveness. It's about asking, "What is needed now?" and trusting that the Holy Spirit isn't just the God of the past—but of the present and the future.

Flexibility looks like a congregation that turns its fellowship hall into a cooling shelter during a heatwave. It sounds like leaders saying, "Let's try it," when a new voice suggests a different way to gather. It feels like a church willing to pause, pivot, and experiment when the Spirit nudges.

Jesus embodied this kind of holy adaptability. He healed on the Sabbath when the law said not to. He preached on hillsides, in boats, and in homes—wherever people could listen. He spoke in parables when plain speech wouldn't do. He never changed the message—but he always met the moment.

Thriving churches follow his lead. In Acts 10, Peter's vision shattered his assumptions. "Do not call anything impure that God has made clean," the Spirit said (v. 15). The early church had to unlearn, relearn, and adapt. Without that flexibility, the Gospel wouldn't have gone beyond Jerusalem.

Flexibility requires humility. It means being willing to be wrong. It means unclenching our fists from tightly held preferences and trusting that resurrection often begins in disruption. "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing!" (Isaiah 43:18–19).

It also means letting go of the idol of perfection. Flexible churches try things. They risk failure. They stay curious. They trust that the Spirit honors movement more than polish.

This is not easy. Some of the greatest resistance to change comes from a place of fear—fear of loss, fear of the unknown, fear of irrelevance. But fear is not our guide. "Perfect love casts out fear" (1 John 4:18). Love—not fear—must be the engine of our innovation.
