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PASTOR'S PARAGRAPH




Last year, Room at the Inn was a mobile ministry that moved from church to church in preparation for an ongoing shelter for women and children who for whatever the reason find themselves suddenly without a place to live.

God has truly blessed these efforts and with widespread community support, The Union Mission and the ongoing Room at the Inn Steering Committee plans for a permanent shelter are becoming an answer to many prayers.

Currently efforts are under way to raise the necessary funds to purchase a house for a more permanent residence. This will enable an ongoing program to provide housing and support during these vulnerable periods these women and children face while in transition. The ministry will help seek housing, jobs and to find emotional, spiritual stability. The house is located at 1239 Hamilton Street, and when it is purchased for the \$25,500, it will need considerable repairs for its use. It's location is just around the corner from the Union Mission. This is ideal and will be a much added benefit to this ministry and these women and children.

Please pray for these efforts, not only as funds are being raised for the house, but also the efforts to minister to these women and children in the months and years to come. If you have questions or would like to find a way to be involved in this ministry, please contact our pastor, who serves as chairperson of the Union Mission Board of Directors.
